In today's readings we are presented with the image of Jesus as our teacher a teacher whose wisdom was captured in the narrative form of the Gospels. Do you ever reflect on your role as a student of Christ? The role of a student is to learn and then prepare to practise what has been studied. Prayer and attentive reception of the Word of God are how we participate in this activity with Our Lord. We can look to the examples of others who preceded us, such as the apostles in the Gospel.

Students need good source materials from which they can learn. Learning comes from exploring these texts from the point of view of our own story; or when studying the Gospel, perhaps aligning our story to the ultimate story of Christ's life as described by the evangelists in the Gospels.

Reflecting on the words of Scripture today, we are reminded of the role both the Law and the Scriptures (both New and Old) plays in our lives. Their careful study can reveal insights to guide and inspire us with our daily lives and the many decisions we are called to make every day.

Let us be grateful for the tradition into which we were baptized, as it presents us with many teachings that can help us as we try to follow Jesus Christ.

1st Reading: Nehemiah 8.2-4a, 5-6, 8-10 **Readings:** 2nd Reading: 1 Corinthians 12.12-30

Gospel: Luke 1.1-4; 4.14-21

Luke intends to present an "orderly account", not in a factual chronological order, but to provide the evidence that will initiate the reader/hearer into knowing the truth, thus leading to faith in Jesus. The proclamation by Jesus in the synagogue is a normal occurrence with a passage familiar to all those present, until he startles his hearers by saying: "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing." Jesus sets out his "goals", that is to release victims, to restore people to wholeness, and transform societies.

- How has Luke prepared for the task of writing his Gospel? If you were writing a Gospel today what view of Jesus would you want to highlight?
- Jesus names particular concerns that will characterize his ministry. As his followers we too are called to release, restore and transform. How are we doing?
- Both the first reading and the Gospel focus on "hearing" the Word of God; how do we know if we are truly hearing God's Word?

Saint of the Week

Saint John Bosco, January 31

Known to many as Don Bosco, this patron saint of youth was born in Piedmont, Italy, in 1815. Raised in poverty, John was ordained in Turin in 1841. After witnessing the circumstances of boys living in a local prison, he resolved to devote himself to working among disadvantaged boys — children living on the street, juvenile delinquents, and any child who was suffering because of disadvantage. He formed the Salesian Society, named after Francis de Sales, and began educating boys of the poor and working classes, holding evening classes in factories, in fields or wherever there was a need. John believed in equipping boys for life in the world and trade schools soon formed a large part of Salesian training. A progressive thinker, he abhorred all punishment, believing that by removing youth from temptation, treating them with dignity and kindness, and enriching them with skills, they could be led to more productive lives. His rule was, "Not with blows, but with charity and gentleness must you draw these friends to the path of virtue "With the help of Saint Mary Mazzarello, he also established the Salesian Sisters to do similar work among girls. John Bosco died in 1888 and was canonized in 1934.
